3. Grants

3.1 February 2017

Team London

Grants from £5 - £12k are available to support organisations who are either aiming to recruit more volunteers in the 59+-69+ age-group, or for organisations that work with older people to be able to recruit more volunteers so that more services can be provided. The grants will be for between £5k and £10k for a 12 month project.

Deadline: 08 February 2017

****Local funding Opportunity!****

Newcomen Collett Foundation

Grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 are available for voluntary and community organisations and schools in Southwark undertaking educational projects for young people under the age of 25.

Deadline: 10 February 2017

CAF Resilience Funding Programme

This new programme from CAF is intended to help smaller charities strengthen their long-term organisational health, so they can continue delivering vital services for their target beneficiaries and communities. Up to £100,000 over two years is available.

Deadline: 10 February 2017 (2pm)

Post Code Local Trust

In 2017 Postcode Local Trust will fund projects that are of local importance across Great Britain which support wildlife areas, sustainability initiatives, local indoor and outdoor spaces and citizenship (local volunteering projects). Grants are available from £500 – to £20,000.

Deadline: 10 February 2017 (for expressions of interest)

Sport England Active Ageing Fund

The programme will support "brilliant" ideas and projects that support inactive older people to become active. Organisations, perhaps working as a partnership, can bid for £50,000 - £500,000. According to Sports England, "You do not need to have a fully-formed project at this stage. It might be that you want to test an innovative idea to learn whether it works, to replicate in other locations something that has already been proven successful or set up something new in your area where there is a real need." The Trust awards grants of up to £5000, with a focus on Arts Grants and Conservation Grants

Veolia has made available £50,000 to support local crowdfunding projects that make use of recycled, reused or reclaimed materials to protect and preserve resources or enhance local environments. [Royal Victoria Hall Foundation](#)

Funding of between £250 and £2,000 to encourage and assist projects in the Greater London area with the performance and/or development of professional dramatic work.

Deadline: 24 February 2017 (5.30pm)

[National Churches Trust](#)

The aim of the Trust is to support churches, chapels and meeting houses so that they remain at the heart of the communities for which they were built and can continue to play an integral part in everyone's lives. The following open programmes offer grants of up to £10,000 / £40,000:

Community Grants; Development Grants and Repair Grants The Community grants prioritises projects that include toilets and catering facilities.

Deadline: 27 February 2017

[GILCHRIST EDUCATIONAL TRUST](#)

Funding for educational projects and/or furnishing and equipment. Also funds overseas work.

Grants range from £500 - £4000.

[Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund: Integration of Third-Country Nationals Grant](#)

Under this EU programme, organisations can apply for a grant of between €450,000 and €750,000. The EU will cover 90% of the total eligible costs of the project / action.

Deadline 28 February 2017 (4pm).

[Arts Council: Capital Small Grants](#)

Grants under this programme supports capital expenditure on buildings and infrastructure including construction and creation of an asset. It aims to support organisations to be more resilient by having the right buildings and equipment to deliver their work and to become more sustainable and innovative. Amount available per application: £100,000 - £499,999

Deadline for seeking permission to apply: 24 February 2017

Deadline for application: 9 March 2017

3.2 March 2017

[BBC Children in Need](#)

The Small Grants programme is open to organisations applying for up to £10,000 per year for up to 3 years. Projects working with children and young people up to 18 years who are experiencing disadvantage through the following can apply: i) Illness, distress, abuse or neglect; ii) Any kind of disability; iii) Behavioural or psychological difficulties; iv) Living in poverty or situations of deprivation.

Deadline: 1 March 2017

[The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund](#)

The Fund supports research into learning disability and the care and relief of those affected by learning disability. Voluntary and community sector organisations can apply for small grants up to £5000, for which there is no deadline. Grants of £10,000 and more is also available and there is a separate deadline. Please check for conditions and exclusions.

Deadline for large grants: 1 March 2017

[AB Charitable Trust](#)

The Trust supports charities that defend human rights and promote respect for vulnerable individuals whatever their circumstances. It is particularly interested in charities that work with marginalised and excluded people in society, with a focus on:

- migrants, refugees and asylum seekers
- prisoners and penal reform
- human rights, particularly access to justice

Grants of up to £20,000 are awarded and organisation should be registered charities.

Deadline: 3 March 2017

[Youth Social Action](#)

The aim of this grant is to raise the level and quality of youth social action. The programme aim is to increase youth social action by 50% by 2020 taking the percentage of young people that volunteer from 40% to 60%. Community groups and organisations can apply for grants of £1000 - £10,000 per project.

Deadline: 6 March 2017 (5pm)

[Deptford Challenge Trust](#)

The Trust aims to improve the quality of life for people who live and work in the DCT area of Lewisham that covers Deptford and parts of New Cross. Grants of between £1,000 and £30,000 is available for activities covering the following themes: Education and skills; Community cohesion and social inclusion; Health & wellbeing and Strengthening the DCT area. Please read the guidelines for more details on each of the themes.

Deadline: 10 March 2017 (5pm)

[The Dan Maskell Tennis Trust](#)

The Trust's focus is creating opportunities and supporting disabled people who want to play tennis and ensuring that tennis is highly accessible to disabled people. It provides specialist wheelchairs, equipment and grants to achieve this aim.

Deadline: 10 March 2017

[Comic Relief Tech vs Abuse](#)

This grant programme aims to build on research results and inspire innovation in the design and delivery of services for people affected by domestic abuse, both online and offline. Grants of between £20,000 and £50,000 over one year are available for projects starting from August 2017 to August 2018. Projects should focus on one of five design challenges developed from the research.

Deadline: 13 March 2017

[The Ulverscroft Foundation](#)

The Foundation supports projects that will have a positive effect on the quality of life of visually impaired people (blind and partially sighted) or people with a print disability. Grants of up to £50,000 is available. Applications should be made in writing and proposals should be as detailed as possible.

Deadline 15 March 2017

Henry Smith Charity Holiday Grants for children

The aim of the programme is to provide access to recreational trips or holidays for groups of children who experience disadvantage or who have disabilities. Applications are currently been accepted for trips taking place in 1 February to 30 April 2017.

Deadline: 17 March 2017

MOPAC Victims Fund

The aim of the Fund is to maximise the potential of voluntary, community and social enterprise (VCSE) organisations to help ensure the continued and improved provision of vital services to support victims of crime and help them cope and recover. Grants of between £10,000 and £35,000 (£5,000 of the grant is for capacity building such as in-house training, purchasing of software etc.) is available to organisations providing support to victims of crime to help them cope and recover from their experience. Partnerships of three or more organisations applying together can receive up to £100,000.

Deadline: 17 March 2017 (5pm)

Alec Dickson Trust

Awards of up to £500 is available to support young people who, through volunteering or community service, aim to enhance the lives of others. The Trust is interested in youth volunteering projects that help to improve communities, especially 'new and exciting' approaches that try to do things a bit differently, such as using social media creatively or using existing resources in new ways.

Deadline: 22 March 2017

London Community Foundation - Peabody Community Fund

Grants of between £500 and £5000 are available to local charities, not-for-profit groups and community organisations for projects and activities that benefit the residents of Peabody estate and housing areas which are located throughout London.

Deadline: 24 March 2017

Rose Foundation

The Building Grant offers between £5,000 and £10,000, which is available for registered charities active in London. The funding is intended to support registered charities undertaking small scale refurbishment and construction projects that cannot afford the kinds of resources and professional advice that larger projects use.

Deadline: 31 March 2017

The Margaret Dobson Further Education Trust

The Trust awards grants to support people with a learning disability after they reach normal school leaving age, to learn skills to help them live more independent lives.

Deadline: 31 March 2017

3.3 April 2017

The Elephant Trust

The Trust supports artists and those presenting their work to undertake and complete projects where lack of funds is a stumbling block. Average grant is in the region of £2000, although there are a few large grants of up to £5000. Priority is given to artists in the fine arts and small organisations and galleries. Check for conditions and exclusions.

Deadline: 10 April 2017

[The Concertina Charitable Trust](#)

The Trust provides grants of up to £250 to charitable organisations which provide musical entertainment and related activities for the elderly. You must include your accounts or financial statements with the application to be considered.

Deadline: 30 April 2017

[Addington Fund Trustees' Discretionary Fund](#)

Grants of up to £50,000 for short term financial aid to farmers and farm businesses, when that emergency situation has or will create unforeseen additional expenditure.

[Allen Lane Foundation](#)

Funds groups working with Asylum-seekers and refugees (but not groups working with a single nationality), Gay, lesbian, bi-sexual or transgender people, Gypsies and Travellers, Migrant workers, Offenders and ex-offenders, Older people, People experiencing mental health problems, People experiencing violence or abuse.

[ASDA Foundation UK \(inc. Northern Ireland\)](#)

The ASDA Foundation is ASDA's charitable trust which was set up in 1988 to support local good causes chosen by their colleagues, and is funded by profits from the midweek national lottery.

[Awards for All - England](#)

Awards for All England is a simple small grants scheme making awards of between 300 and 10,000.

[Bermondsey Square Community Fund](#)

The Bermondsey Square Community Fund expects to spend around £40,000 each year. There is no maximum or minimum size of grant but prefer applications between £500 and £2,500.

[Clothworkers' Foundation - UK](#)

The Clothworkers Foundation aims through its funding to improve the quality of life, particularly for people and communities facing disadvantage.

[Fidelity UK Foundation](#)

Seeks to support strategic initiatives that enable charitable organisations to reach new levels of achievement. Grants are intended to strengthen charities and encourage the highest standards of management and long-term sustainability. Grants will not normally cover the entire cost of a project. Average 50k.

[Freemasons' Grand Charity - Non-Masonic Grants \(England & Wales\)](#)

The charities and projects supported by The Freemasons' Grand Charity are chosen because they deliver important services, complement the work of other charities or tackle issues that are less popular with other funders. The Charity supports people in need and funds the work of charities helping the wider community.

Galaxy Hot Chocolate Fund

GALAXY Hot Chocolate is looking to help small, local community groups and charities across the UK, with the launch of an exciting new charitable fund.

Garfield Weston Foundation

The Garfield Weston Foundation helps small local community organisations and are prepared to consider applications covering a wide range of charitable activity. Areas funded include: education, arts, health, general, environment, community, youth, religion and welfare Up to 50k

Henry Smith's Charity

The Henry Smith Charity is a large grant making charity. They make grants totalling approximately 25 million each year to up to 1,000 organisations and charities for initiatives and projects that address social inequality and economic disadvantage.

Ibrahim Foundation

This Foundation makes grants to organisations which aim to improve the quality of life for people and communities in the UK, both now and in the future. They like to consider work which others may find hard to fund, perhaps because it breaks new ground, appears too risky, requires core funding, or needs a more unusual form of financial help such as a loan.

Jill Franklin Charitable Trust

Grants support refugees, self-help mental health groups, churches for restoration, respite holidays prisoners education 500 to 1000

Laing Family Trusts

The Laing Family Trusts are a group of four grant-making trusts (Beatrice Laing Trust, Kirby Laing Foundation, Maurice & Hilda Laing Charitable Trust and Martin Laing Foundation) sharing a single administration.

London Housing Foundation - London

This trust supports homelessness charities and agencies in London through grant funding and initiatives. In terms of the former, the Foundation will be looking for evidence that agencies are contemplating marked changes that enhance their capabilities, either in scale or scope of their programmes; or the direction of their work.

Lloyds Enable Programme

Enable grants are up to a total of £15,000 over one or two years, and can reinvigorate charities through funding organisational improvements, development of areas such as leadership and governance, improved systems and demonstrating outcomes.

Macmillan - Supporting You to Help Others Grant

Macmillan supports groups and individuals who support people affected by cancer or campaign to improve cancer care with training, grants and resources, to help them develop.

Merchant Taylors' Consolidated Charities for the Infirm

Grants are available for charitable organisations providing services to people living with significant disabilities or health concerns in South East London. Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. Most awards are between £5,000 and £15,000. The mean amount is around £7,000.

Reaching Communities

This Big Lottery programme is for projects that help people and communities most in need. Grant size is for £10,00 and upwards and projects can run up to 5years. It can also include building projects.

Santander Foundation

The Santander Foundation funds programmes to support disadvantaged people through one or both of these charitable priorities, education and training or financial capability

Screwfix Foundation

The Screwfix Foundation is a new charity set up by Screwfix in 2013. It has a clear purpose of raising funds to support projects that will fix, repair, maintain and improve properties and community facilities specifically for those in need in the UK.

Sir John Cass's Foundation - Grants to Schools and Organisations

Grants of between £10,000 and £30,000 are available for schools and organisations to support education and rehabilitation projects in inner London boroughs.

Sport England - Small Grant Scheme

Grants of between 300 and 10,000 are available for revenue and small capital projects. The total project costs must not exceed 50,000.

The Rufford Foundation

The Rufford Foundation is an independent grant-making trust. The Rufford Foundation's main remit is to support nature conservation projects in developing countries undertaken by small to medium-sized organisations.

The Torch Trophy Trust

The Torch Trophy Trust is a charitable organisation, whose main aim is to encourage voluntary work in sport and other related outdoor activities within local communities across the U.K.

Trust for London

Funding of up to £100,000 is available for work that develops new and imaginative ways of addressing the root causes of London's social problems, especially work which has the potential to influence and change policy, practice and public attitudes. Themes: Employment; Advice; Social Justice; Violence and Small Groups. The maximum grant given under the small groups theme is usually in the region of £30,000.

Wakefield and Tetley Trust - Fast Track Grants **!Southwark opportunity!**

Grants of between £100 and £2,500 are available for charitable organisations working to improve the lives of people in the London boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Southwark and the City of London who face significant disadvantage and have limited opportunities.

Woodland Trust - Free Trees

Free trees for school, community and youth groups. The Woodland Trust have 4000 free tree packs to give away to school, community and youth groups this autumn.

Worshipful Company of Weavers

The Worshipful Company of Weavers funds projects working with young people in need or at risk, rehabilitation and resettlement of young prisoners and ex-prisoners. Up to 15k

Zurich Community Trust (UK) Ltd

Zurich Community Trust has a dynamic grant-making programme which supports more than 600 charities every year, touching the lives of over 100,000 disadvantaged people. Main areas are Wiltshire, Gloucester and Hampshire although small funding across UK.

5. Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) and other offers

[Involve - Corporate support through practical Team Challenges](#)

The Involve programme at Community Southwark aims to drive practical corporate support to charities, social enterprises, community organisations and schools in Southwark, helping them to improve both their indoor and outdoor spaces. With teams of between 10 and 50 corporate volunteers we can complete those large projects that are usually not taken on due to lack of resources in just 1 or 2 days. The Involve Team both organises and facilitates the volunteer Team Challenges and liaises directly with the corporate partner who will fund all tools and materials for each project so the service is FREE to our community partners. Grants of between £2,500 and £10,000 to small, locally led community organisations, funded by the 5p levy on plastic bags.

6. Loans

[Bright Ideas Trust \(London\)](#)

Intended specifically to help London-based young entrepreneurs, the Trust will address the issue of first-time businesses failing soon after setting up, due to a lack of experience. Maximum employees is 50 and the loans are between £1,000 and £25,000

[Fredericks Foundation](#)

Provision of loans to small businesses and start-ups in Berkshire, East Sussex, Northamptonshire, Bristol & Bath, Gloucestershire, Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Hampshire, Somerset, Cambridgeshire, Isle of Wight, Surrey, Cornwall, Kent, West Sussex, Derbyshire, Lincolnshire, Wiltshire, Devon and London. Loans are available from £500 to £10,000 per business, over terms from six months to five years at competitive interest rates. Loans of up to £20,000 may be available for established businesses with a financial track record of at least three years in some areas.

[Big Issue Invest - Social Enterprise Invest Fund](#)

Financial assistance is available in the form of loans to social enterprises and registered charities based in the UK. Loans of between £50,000 - £1.5 million can be provided. Grants are not provided.

[Big Society Capital](#)

Investments are available to Social Investment Finance Intermediaries (SIFIs) based and working within the UK for projects tackling major social issues within the UK. Loan investment of between £500,000 and £15 million.

[CAN Early Intervention Fund](#)

The Fund supports early intervention projects and aims to accelerate positive early intervention impact on communities and individuals in London.

[‘Life chances’ Fund](#)

Organisations working on projects to support young people and early years development can now apply for top-up funding from an £80m fund to support social impact bonds and payment-by-results. The ‘Life Chances’ Fund was launched in July 2016, and will support local public sector organisations to commission social impact bonds and other payment-by-results contracts involving "socially-minded investors". **Closing date for Expressions of interest: 28 February 2017.**

[Charity Bank - Loan Finance](#)

Affordable loan finance and advice to registered charities, as well as to community associations, voluntary organisations, community businesses, social enterprises or a social landlord, as long as the purpose of the loan is charitable and to help them to grow. It often lends where banks or building societies either will not make a loan at all, or will only do so on unaffordable terms.

Community Investment Fund

Loans and equity investments are available to community based, locally led charities and social enterprises in England that are providing essential health, social care, education and training services to improve the well-being of local residents. Loans and investments of between £250,000 and £1 million are available. Most investments are expected to be secured against the investee's assets.

Start Up Loans

This is a government-backed personal loan scheme which offers an affordable source of finance and is available to individuals looking to start or grow a business in the UK. Applicants can borrow from £500 to £25,000, with a fixed interest rate of just 6% per annum and a 1-5year repayment term. Loan recipients are also offered up to 12 months of mentoring support and access to a range of special business offers.

7. Crowdfunding

Crowdfunding is a form of microfinance where large numbers of individuals make small donations towards new projects or start-up enterprises.

As well as Crowdfunding (above) there are now so many ways to fundraise online – but which sites will work for your organisation and what do they all do?

[Making the most of digital donations: A practical guide to selecting and using online giving platforms](#) (PDF) offers organisations a strategic approach when choosing a provider and will be a valuable resource for all charities that are looking at how they can maximise their fundraising presence online by working with online giving platforms. The guide will also be particularly useful for smaller charities that may be less sure about how online giving platforms work or what they need to do when working with different partners. (Charity Finance Group)

The amount your charity gets can vary vastly depending on which website you pick - this site-by-site guide helps you decide where to set your fundraising page up. [Money Saving Expert](#) has a useful comparison tool to help you choose.
